



In the spring of 2005, he added an additional five acres with 5,000 vines, producing more than 11,000 bottles.


Domaine Perrault was incorporated in 2005 and is owned and operated by Denis, his wife Lynne and daughter Anne.





I am grateful for the opportunity to represent the Plowmen's Association as this year's Queen of the Furrow!





Plowing Match Rules

- 1. Registration will take place at 9:00 a.m.
- 2. Entry Fee is \$10.
- 3. Ontario Plowmen's Association rules apply with the following exceptions:
 - a) 3 hour time rule is suspended. Plowing will commence at 10 a.m. All plowing must end by 3:30 p.m.
 - b) No open split required for amateur classes.
- Age of contestants is as of January 1, 2018.
- 5. Score sheet will be available for review after the banquet. Personal scores will be sent to each plowman.
- 6. Antique Class tractors may be on either rubber or steel.
- 7. Horse classes may use either a sulky or jointer plow.
- 8. Judge's decision is final. Two land stewards will be allocated for the day.
- 9. No riders are allowed on tractors during competition.
- **10.** Contestants must provide appropriate confirmation of \$2,000,000 public liability insurance.
- 11. Horse competitors must have their horses attended at all times for safety reasons. Failure to comply with this rule at any time during the day, will result in the pulling of the plowman's land stake.
- **12.** All persons providing tractors or horses to be used in various classes or taking part in any activity at the match must provide documentary proof that they carry \$2,000,000 public liability insurance.



Judging Guidelines - Conventional Plowing

OPEN SPLIT

One round shall be plowed to form the Open Split. Furrow slices are turned out such that when the Crown is completed all land under the Crown is moved. The Open Split is judged from 20 points in two categories:

STRAIGHTNESS (10 POINTS)

• All furrow slices and cut lines shall be straight.

CUT & UNIFORMITY (10 POINTS)

- All sod/stubble shall be cut throughout the length and width of open split so that no uncut area will remain under Crown furrow slices;
- Each furrow slice shall (individually) be uniform throughout the length of the Open Split;
- Neatness shall be considered a factor of uniformity.

CROWN -

After completion of the open split, the next:

- 6 rounds, (one furrow plows)
- 4 rounds, (two furrow plows)
- 3 rounds, (three or more furrow plows)

constitute the Crown. The complete Crown is judged from 40 points in four categories:

STRAIGHTNESS (10 POINTS)

• All furrow slices of Crown shall be straight.

CLOSENESS & CONFORMITY (10 POINTS)

- All furrow slices shall fit tightly together with no openings (holes), particular attention paid to closeness of the first furrow slice on each side;
- All furrow slices shall conform (match one another) as to height, width, shape, size and appearance;
- Marking or distortion of furrow slice(s) caused by extensive paddle use shall adversely affect conformity score;
- · No tractor wheel marks;
- Furrows shall start and end at scratch.

BURYING GRASS & STUBBLE (10 POINTS)

• All grass, stubble and surface trash shall be completely covered.

SOIL AVAILABILITY (10 POINTS)

- Shall be enough soil to produce seed bed with minimal secondary tillage;
- Stipulated minimal depth shall be achieved by the sixth furrow;
- Soil availability shall be affected by shallow furrows, open furrows, lack of conformity and or uniformity, and uncovered grass or stubble.

GENERAL WORK —

All furrows plowed between the Crown and the Finish is the General Work. The General Work is judged from 40 points in four categories:

COVERING OF GRASS (10 POINTS)

• All grass, stubble and surface trash shall be completely covered.

CLOSENESS & PACKING (10 POINTS)

- All furrow slices shall be tightly closed and packed with no openings (holes);
- No wheel marks.

FIRMNESS (10 POINTS)

- Furrow slices shall be firm and not collapse when stepped on;
- Firmness of structure and placement of furrow slice, not type of soil.

SOIL AVAILABILITY (10 POINTS)

- Shall be enough soil to produce seed bed with minimal secondary tillage;
- Stipulated minimal depth shall be maintained;
- Soil availability shall be affected by shallow furrows, open furrows, lack of conformity and/or uniformity, and uncovered grass or stubble.

FINISH -

The Finish consists of the last 12 furrows (i.e. six furrows of the cast-off side and five furrows plus the sole furrow on the Crown side). The Finish is judged from 40 points in four categories:

STRAIGHTNESS (10 POINTS)

• All furrows shall be straight.

GRASS & NEATNESS (10 POINTS)

- All grass, stubble and surface trash shall be completely covered;
- Shall be no loose soil or trash in bottom of sole furrow;
- Only one tire mark shall be allowed. Shall have neat appearance.

SHALLOWNESS & NARROWNESS (10 POINTS)

- No step in tractor classes;
- 4" step in horse classes;
- Stipulated minimal depth shall be maintained until the last two rounds;
- The final pass depth shall confirm to average depth of complete land;
- Width of sole furrow shall confirm to average furrow width of complete land;
- The allowed tire track shall carry on top of furrow slice.

SOIL AVAILABILITY & CONFORMITY (10 POINTS)

- Shall be enough soil to produce seed bed with minimal secondary tillage;
- Sole furrow slice shall be 3/4 to 7/8 the height of previous furrows;
- The allowed tire track shall carry on top of furrow slice;
- Soil availability shall be affected by shallow furrows, deep tractor track, open furrows, lack of conformity and/or uniformity, and uncovered grass or stubble.

GENERAL APPEARANCE –

After the judging of each of the areas indicated above is completed, the complete land is judged as to General Appearance. General Appearance is judged from 60 points in six categories:

STRAIGHTNESS (10 POINTS)

· All furrow slices shall be straight.

CONFORMITY (10 POINTS)

- All furrow slices shall conform (match one another) as to height, width, shape, size and appearance, from scratch to scratch, across the complete plowed land;
- · No pairing.

DISTINCTNESS OF FURROW (10 POINTS)

• Each furrow slice shall be clearly defined.

UNIFORMITY AND SHAPE OF FURROW (10 POINTS)

- Each furrow slice shall be neat, uniform in height, width, shape, size and appearance for the entire length of plot;
- Furrows shall start and end at scratch;
- Furrow slices in stubble shall be well turned over with rounded top to provide sufficient soil availability;
- Furrow slices in sod shall be turned through 135 degrees. In this
 position both the side and bottom of the furrow slice will lay 45 degrees
 to vertical.

SHAPE OF LAND (10 POINTS)

- Complete land shall have a clean, sharp, pleasing appearance;
- Complete land shall show proper relationship of Crown, to body of land, to Finish.

INS AND OUTS (10 POINTS)

- All soil inside of scratch furrows shall be turned with a minimum amount of head land being disturbed:
- No furrow slice shall be turned outside the scratch:
- Ins and Outs shall be neat and clean:
- No tire marks inside scratch.







What is Plowing All About?

The plow is one of the oldest tillage tools known. One of the oldest plows know to exist (said to date from 2000 BC) is a testament to the timelessness of this tillage practice. The first plows were little more than crooked sticks with one or more prongs digging into the soil. Later, animals or humans were harnessed to a pole, with a short stub of a branch on one end. By Roman times, wooden plows that somewhat resemble our modern plows, were pulled with oxen. Later wheels were added to the beam in order to control the depth of plowing more easily. With the easier manufacture of steel, the use of steel plows became common.

Ottawa Carleton Plowmen's Association

Plowing Matches have been a part of Ontario's agricultural history for well over a century. They are an opportunity for farmers to display their skills in plowing and to teach the importance of soil conservation. At our local match our plowmen use equipment ranging from the newer reversible plows to walking plows with a team of horses. Examples of a century of agricultural history can be found in one field. Participants' work in the field is scored in 10 areas with the final score being out of 200 for tractors, and 180 for horses. These scores are used to determine if the participant has the skill level needed to participate at the International Plowing Match (IPM).

The Ottawa Carleton Plowmen's Association (OCPA) is celebrating its 90th year in 2014. In 1919 Melvin A. Powell of Marlborough Township encouraged other plowmen from the area to create the Marlborough and North Gower Plowmen's Association. This group was very active. Along with its annual plowing matches it hosted its first International Plowing Match (IPM) in 1932 at the Central Experimental Farm.

The OCPA is a member of the Ontario Plowmen's Association and works to promote agriculture in the Ottawa area. Since 2002 the OCPA has been involved in the Plowing for a Cure golf event in the hopes of fulfilling the Navan IPM's dream of supporting the Ottawa Hospital. Money raised has gone to colon, lung, liver and colorectal cancer research. In its eight years, this event has raised \$144,717 for The Ottawa Hospital Foundation. Thanks to matching funds programs available to the Hospital for our projects, this amount has blossomed into an overall contribution of \$424,914 for Ottawa Hospital Cancer Center programs.

The OCPA also works to support 4-H activities in the Ottawa area. In the past this has been done through financial support for projects such as competing at the Royal Winter Fair and work with 4-H members in the plowing and environmental club.
